This award is a U.S. book prize given some years by the Santa Barbara Book Council to "a California writer whose work raises the standard of literary excellence." The award is named in honor of California mystery novelist, Ross Macdonald, whose novels were set in a fictionalized version of Santa Barbara, California.

Lisa See is the New York Times bestselling author of Snow Flower and the Secret Fan,
Peony in Love, Shanghai Girls, Dreams of Joy, and China Dolls. Her recent novel, The Tea Girl
of Hummingbird Lane, was an instant New York Times bestseller. Her new novel, The Island
of Sea Women, was released in March 2019. Jodi Picoult has given her praise: "Lisa See
excels at mining the intersection of family, friendship and history in her newest novel.
This novel spans wars and generations, but at its heart is a beautifully rendered story
of two women whose individual choices become inextricably tangled."



Steph Post (Monday, 8:00 p.m.)

Steph Post is the author of the novels Miraculum, Walk in the Fire, Lightwood, and A Tree Born Crooked. She graduated from Davidson College as a recipient of the Patricia Cornwell Scholarship and winner of the Vereen Bell award, and she holds a Master's degree in Graduate Liberal Studies from UNCW. Her work has most recently appeared in Garden & Gun, NonBinary Review and the anthology Stephen King's Contemporary Classics. She has been nominated for a Pushcart Prize, a Rhysling Award and was a semi-finalist for The Big Moose Prize.



Stephen Markley (Tuesday, 8:00 p.m.)

Stephen Markley's debut novel is *Ohio*. In it he depicts an American generation fumbling through disillusionment and a turbulent new age of war, addiction, political unrest, and unemployment. Markley is a gifted writer, masterfully weaving together the stories of his protagonists through a variety of perspectives and timelines that culminate in a stunning reveal. Stephen Markley is an author, screenwriter, and journalist. A graduate of the lowa Writer's Workshop, Markley's previous books include the memoir *Publish This Book:The Unbelievable True Story of How I Wrote*, *Sold, and Published This Very Book*, and the travelogue *Tales of Iceland*.




Matthew Pallamary (Wednesday, 4:00 p.m.)

Taylor Jenkins Reid is the author of *The Seven Husbands of Evelyn Hugo, One True Loves, Maybe in Another Life, After I Do,* and *Forever, Interrupted.* Her novels have been Indie Next Picks, chosen by Book of the Month, and featured in *People, US Weekly, Entertainment Weekly, Good Morning America*, and more. Her newest novel is *Daisy Jones and the Six.* She lives in Los Angeles.



Jeffrey C. Stewart (Thursday, 8:00 p.m.)

Jeffrey C. Stewart is a National Book Award Winner for Nonfiction, the Pulitzer Prize and the Mark Lynton Prize for History, all for his stunning biography, The New Negro: The Life of Alain Locke. He is a Professor of Black Studies at UC Santa Barbara, where he was chair of the department from 2008-2016. Dr. Stewart is the author of numerous articles, essays and books. Other titles are Paul Robeson: Artist and Citizen and 1001 Things Everyone Should Know about African American History. Professor Stewart has taught at Harvard University, Yale University, UCLA, Tufts University, Howard University, Scripps College, and George Mason University.



Agents Panel

(Moderator) As an agent, Eric Myers has a strong affinity for young adult and middle grade fiction, as well as adult nonfiction, especially in the areas of history, biography, psychology, health and wellness, true crime, performing arts, and pop culture. He

also represents thrillers, urban fantasy and historical fiction. He's open to memoir from writers who already have a strong platform. He does not represent poetry, literary fiction, plays, screenplays, short-story collections or children's picture books.

Annie Bomke is looking for a wide variety of fiction and nonfiction, including commercial and literary fiction, upmarket fiction, mysteries (hilarious cozies to gritty police procedurals and everything in between), historical fiction, women's fiction, psychological thrillers, literary/psychological horror, YA fiction, self-help, business, health/diet, cookbooks, memoir, relation-

ships, current events, psychology, and narrative nonfiction. Prior to founding her own agency, Annie spent 8 years at Margret McBride Literary Agency, where she worked with internationally bestselling authors such as Ken Blanchard, Spencer Johnson, Bob Burg and John Assaraf.





Charlotte Gusay is founder of The Charlotte Gusay Literary Agency. Her love of the literary has deep roots. She's known as the "Diane Keaton" of agents - eclectic, quality, and selective in choosing projects to represent. She represents fiction, nonfiction, young adult, with movie potential, entertainment rights, books to film, selected screenplays and screenwriters. She often partners with WGA film agents. The Charlotte Gusay Literary Agency looks for those books that are both quality and commercial. The writing must be superb, the voice, seductive.

Dara Hyde is a senior agent at the Hill Nadell Literary Agency in Los Angeles and represents a wide range of fiction and nonfiction, including literary, historical, and genre fiction, graphic novels, narrative nonfiction, memoir, and young adult. Before joining Hill Nadell, Dara spent over a decade as an editor



and foreign rights and permissions manager at independent publisher, Grove Atlantic, in New York. She's always on the lookout for strong fiction, and she's working on several nonfiction projects right now as well.

Dana Newman of Dana Newman Literary is an LA-based independent agent representing authors of practical and narrative nonfiction and literary and upmarket fiction. She's interested in nonfiction by authors with unique perspectives and established platforms.



She looks for compelling narrative nonfiction in the areas of memoir, biography, history, pop culture, current affairs/women's interest, social trends, and sports/fitness. A favorite is literary nonfiction: true stories, well told, that read like a novel you can't put down. She considers a selective amount of literary fiction and women's upmarket fiction.

Mary C. Moore was promoted to literary agent with Kimberley Cameron & Associates in 2015. Always an avid reader, she discovered a love of writing as an adult and received her MFA in Creative Writing and English from Mills College, Oakland. She represents all



fiction genres, ages middle-grade and up. Currently she is particularly keen for contemporary YA, literary women's fiction, and whimsical middle-grade, but she will consider all fiction, including fantasy, science fiction, genre romance, and thrillers with female protagonists.

Liz Parker heads Verve Publishing at Verve Talent & Literary. She represents upmarket and literary fiction, select thrillers, suspense and YA, as well as memoir, sociopolitical, narrative and platform-driven nonfiction. Liz began her career in editorial,



serving as an editorial assistant at Viking/Penguin, and then as the publishing director at Counterpoint and Soft Skull Press. She was a literary and film scout with Maria B. Campbell Associates, and spent 3 years as a literary agent with InkWell Management before joining Verve in 2018.



He was awarded a Gold Medal from The Independent Book Publishers Association in 2009 for Dream Helper.

Moderator Marla Miller's workshop this year is Hooking the Reader. Her experience in traditional publishing inspired her to launch Marketing the Muse workshops at SBWC. She works with writers on the road to publication.



Elizabeth Gould wrote Your Best Health by Friday: How to Overcome Anxiety, Depression, Stress, Trauma, PTSD, and Chronic Illness, which explains the links between stress, inflammation, and illness, and provides action steps to heal. She's now an energy healer and teacher of specialized kinesiology. She'll be speaking at the Brain Gym Conference this August and teaching PanHarmonic Healing as part of their post-conference courses. Elizabeth has been boosting books sales and strengthening her author platform through speaking and teaching in her areas of expertise.



Flor Edwards by age 12, had lived in 24 different locations across 3 continents. Always on the move to escape the Antichrist and in preparation for the Apocalypse in 1993, her no-madic childhood prompted her to pen her memoir *Apocalypse Child:A Life in End Times*. In her debut memoir, *Flor* movingly describes her early life growing up with her family and 11 siblings as a member of The Children of God, a controversial religious movement that many describe as an apocalyptic cult. She has been speaking frequently since her book's publication.



Hendrika de Vries has been a Jungian-oriented therapist and adjunct faculty at Pacifica Graduate Institute, where she helped students explore archetypal patterns of their life stories. When a Toy Dog Became a Wolf and the Moon Broke Curfew...is her upcoming memoir about her childhood in Nazi-occupied Amsterdam. When the manuscript was done, she thought the hard work was over. Not so. Then came learning the importance of metadata, editing, proofreading, finding a publicist, gathering endorsements (blurbs), setting goals, and navigating the maze of social media.



Jake Wachtel's media and entertainment industry experience includes both the creative and production side of content creation. Wachtel started as an award-winning international journalist. Jake has worked as a producer, writer, and director on a range of projects for numerous media companies, including NBC, Universal, DreamWorksTV, and TBS. Wachtel heads up the digital division at Innovative Artists Talent and Literary Agency and also serves as the Department Chair of Digital Arts and Production at ITU. An expert at creating a media presence, his experience puts him at the nexus of entertainment and technology.


